The purpose of the College Profile and Institutional Effectiveness Report is to provide salient information about Ventura College students, courses, programs, and employees, as well as evaluating the effectiveness of the institution. The report contains data and analytical information related to demographic characteristics of students and staff, course outcomes, student persistence (retention), and program awards. Thirteen Core Indicators of Effectiveness, which were established by the College Planning Council (CPC) in spring 2012, were assessed most recently in summer 2015 – the results are published in this report.

A. Overview of the VCCCD

Introduction

The Ventura County Community College District (VCCCD) is a public community college district serving the residents of Ventura County. The VCCCD is comprised of three colleges: Moorpark College, Oxnard College and Ventura College. Each college offers educational programs that (a) lead to AA/AS Degrees and Certificates, (b) provide preparation for transfer to four-year colleges and universities, (c) provide occupational and vocational training, and (d) address basic skills needs. The individual colleges also offer specialty programs/areas that are unique to the particular college. Additionally, colleges are involved in community service and economic development, and providing continuing education for cultural growth, life enrichment, and skills improvement. In fall 2014, at 4th-week census, the VCCCD enrolled 31,830 students.

Colleges

<u>Ventura College</u> is one of the oldest community colleges in California. Higher education in Ventura County began in 1925 when a junior college department was added to the high school in Ventura, and Ventura Junior College was founded shortly after. In 1955, the college moved to its present 112-acre hillside campus in the western part of Ventura. In fall 2014, at fourth-week census, there were 12,989 students enrolled at Ventura College. The Ventura College service area consists of the City of Ventura, the City of Fillmore, the community of Piru, the City of Santa Paula, the City of Ojai, the communities of Mira Monte and Oak View. (See map.)



Moorpark College is the second-oldest and largest of the colleges, located on 150 acres of sloping hillside land in the eastern region of Ventura County. The college has been serving the community since 1967. In fall 2014, at fourth-week census, there were 14,006 students enrolled at Moorpark College.

The Moorpark College service area consists of the City of Newbury Park, the City of Thousand Oaks, the City of Westlake Village, the City of Moorpark, the community of Santa Susana, the City of Simi Valley, and the community of Brandeis.

Oxnard College, founded in 1975, is the newest of the three community colleges in the county. Set on 118 acres and located two miles from Pacific Ocean beaches, the college is easily accessible by the Ventura Freeway or the Pacific Coast Highway. In fall 2014, at fourth-week census, there were 7,108 students enrolled at Oxnard College.

The Oxnard College service area consists of the City of Camarillo, the City of Oxnard, the community of Somis, the City of Port Hueneme, and Naval Base Ventura County (Point Mugu and the Construction Battalion Base at Port Hueneme).





B-2. Ventura County: Population by Gender

Females account for *slightly* over **50%** of Ventura County's population. Population projections from the State of California show the percentage of females in Ventura County holding steady at the current rate of **50.2%** (± **0.1**). The tables below indicate estimated population growth by gender for Ventura County from 2005 to 2050.

At Ventura College, females comprise **55%** of the student body; while nationally, women account for **57%** of post-secondary enrollments. It is expected that future enrollments by females at Ventura College will remain at the current rate (**55%**) or begin to slowly approach the national level (**57%**).



B-3. Ventura County: Population by Race/Ethnicity

Currently, Hispanics account for almost **40%** of Ventura County's population, while Whites represent over **half** (**51%**) of county residents. By 2035, however, it is estimated that the ratio between Hispanics and Whites will reverse: Hispanics will comprise **50%** of county residents and Whites will account for **40%**. The population projections and percentage distributions are shown in the tables below. At Ventura College in **fall 2014**, Hispanics accounted for **57%** of the student body, with Whites representing **31%** of students.

B-4. Ventura County: Population by Age Group

During the next twenty years (2010 - 2030), Ventura County is projected to experience an increase in the percentage of its population who are 35 years of age or older. Although the percentage of county residents in the 18 to 29 age range is projected to decrease by 2.6 percentage points over that period, the actual number of individuals in the 18 to 29 age group is estimated to *increase* by 6,784. Because the majority of students at Ventura College are under 30 years of age (almost 83% in fall 2014), demand for transfer-level classes at VC will probably not diminish over the next twenty years (all other factors being equal). With a projected absolute and percentage growth in county residents who are 65 years of age or older, the college may also find an increase in enrollments in classes of interest to older individuals.

C-1. VC Service Area: Race/Ethnicity by City




Overall, **42.7**% of individuals residing in Ventura College's service area are Hispanic or Latino. The chart below depicts Hispanic/Latino percentages in the areas that are served by Ventura College. At **78**%, the City of Santa Paula has the highest percentage of Hispanic/Latino residents in the VC service area. The Ojai Valley, at **20.9**%, has the lowest Hispanic/Latino percentage of the major political/geographical components of the Ventura College service area.

C-2. VC Service Area: Feeder High Schools

Ninety-one percent (91%) of fall 2014 first-time VC students who graduated high school in 2014 attended a Ventura County high school. In the table below, county high schools are listed according to the number of their 2014 graduates that were first-time students at VC in fall 2014. Since the City of Oxnard borders the City of Ventura to the south, many residents of Oxnard choose to attend Ventura College rather than, or in addition to, Oxnard College.

A. Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative

At its March 16, 2015 meeting, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges adopted a framework of institutional effectiveness indicators to measure the ongoing condition of a CCC's operational environment. For 2015–2016, each college is required to develop, implement, and post a goals framework that minimally includes the following areas: Student Performance and Outcomes, Accreditation Status, Fiscal Viability, and Programmatic Compliance with State and Federal Guidelines. II. INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS MEASURES

B. Core Indicators of Effectiveness

Introduction

Ventura College's Core Indicators of Effectiveness, developed by the College Planning Council and approved in May 2012, are broad measures that act as important gauges of the college's overall effectiveness as an institution of higher education. The measures were self-selected by the institution and data associated with them will be tracked over time to ascertain the college's performance related to each indicator. These metrics should <u>not</u> be viewed as the sole measures for evaluating the success or failure of Ventura College since some students attend the institution for reasons other than the obtainment of degrees or certificates or for transfer to four-year schools.

VC's Core Indicators of Effectiveness are publicly shared within the context of celebrating accomplishments and identifying areas needing improvement and are not used to evaluate the effectiveness of discrete courses, faculty or students. The measures are intended as an overall portrait of the institutional effectiveness of Ventura College and are not presented in ranked order of importance.

Indicators of Effectiveness

The college has established the following thirteen Core Indicators of Effectiveness.

1. Course Completion Rate

Using VC's **2008–2009** course completion rate as a **baseline**, **maintain or increase** the fall/spring annual course completion rate in future years.

The Course Completion Rate is the <u>percentage</u> of students who do <u>not</u> withdraw (receive W's) from class and who receive a grade notation of A, B, C, P, D, F, NP, RD, or I*.

(The Course Completion Rate was formerly known as the Retention Rate)

2. Course Success Rate

Using VC's **2008–2009** course success rate as a **baseline**, **maintain or increase** the fall/spring annual course success rate in future years.

The Course Success Rate is the <u>percentage</u> of students who receive a passing/satisfactory grade notation of A, B, IB, C, IC, or P.

3. Student Retention Rates

Using VC's **fall 2008** student retention rates as **baselines**, **maintain or increase** the fall-to-fall retention rates of **all** <u>first-time</u> students (whose primary college was VC) and <u>first-time</u> students by **ethnicity**.

The Student Retention Rate is the <u>percentage</u> of first-time fall students who receive a grade of A, B, C, P, D, F, NP, I*, or W in the succeeding spring <u>and</u> fall terms. (Formerly known as Persistence Rate)

4. Student Satisfaction

In **2015–2016**, establish target student satisfaction goals based on the spring 2009 district-wide Survey of Student Perceptions.

5. Student Engagement

Score at or above the mean in each of the five CCSSE Benchmarks of Effective Educational Practice:

C. Overall Evaluation of Institutional Effectiveness

In spring 2012, the College Planning Council (CPC), a participatory governance committee, developed the VC Core Indicators of Effectiveness. Using Effectiveness Indicators from several colleges as models, the CPC analyzed and discussed the various effectiveness measures before deciding on the particular metrics that were most applicable to Ventura College. The college Institutional Research Officer provided expertise regarding data sources, and baselines for each indicator were discussed extensively during CPC meetings throughout most of the spring 2012 semester. Campus-wide input on the Core Indicators and associated benchmarks was obtained by CPC members from their respective divisions. The Academic Senate President, as co-chair of the CPC, shared draft documents with Senate members and kept them fully aware of all CPC proceedings.

The Core Indicators of Effectiveness, which contain 29 elements, were approved by the College Planning Council in May 2012, and they represent the key components of the Institutional Effectiveness Report. Data related to the Core Indicators are being tracked by the Office of Research and Evaluation to determine the degree to which the college is meetings its effectiveness goals.

A Scoreboard was developed by the Institutional Researcher in order for the college to easily see whether or not goals were being met in each of the 29 areas.

The 2015 Scoreboard indicates that the college met 14 of the 29 effectiveness indicators (three have not yet been measured). For Course Completion, Course Success, and Retention Rate, we met the goals and improved in each area from the prior year. In looking at the disaggregated data by ethnicity for retention rates, Hispanic students, which make up 53% of our student population, increased as did the rates for Asian and Native American students. The retention rate for Black students, however, decreased from the prior year and continues to be an area in which the institution needs to focus. Interventions to improve outcomes for Black students have been developed through the VC's Student Equity Plan, and will be implemented in the 2015-2016 academic year. The administration of the student satisfaction survey was delayed until the spring 2015 semester due to a number of district-wide issues. The results are still being compiled, but preliminary analyses indicate that a number of revisions to the survey are necessary in order for it to provide the type of information that can be easily acted upon. This revision will take place during 2016, with the goal of administering it again in spring 2017.

For the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) indicators, the college did not meet any of the five benchmarks this year. However, all of the benchmark scores increased between 2013 and 2015. Data from the survey show that, among full-time students, our rates exceeded the goal in every category; however, among part-time students, we did not meet the goal in any of the five categories. Additional efforts will need to be made to increase the rates of student engagement among our part-time students.

In fall 2013, the previous ARCC goals were replaced by benchmarks generated from the new state Scorecard. Scorecard data for 2015 indicates that the college performed above the state average on approximately half of these metrics. Of note, is that VC exceeded the statewide average for the overall completion rate, and for the completion rate of unprepared students. These two metrics are the ones that are most frequently discussed and focused on at the state, district, and college level. However, the VC is below the state average in persistence. The College President placed a specific focus on persistence at the Fall 2015 FLEX Day. Further, VC recently joined the Achieving the Dream national initiative, which places a priority on improving both persistence and completion among underrepresented groups.

The goal for Degree and Certificate Completion was met. In the area of Transfer, the college has met its goals for Transfer to Four-Year Institutions and Transfer Certified. Licensure Pass Rate goals were met in Registered Nursing and Paramedic; the goals for Emergency Medical Technician and Certified Nursing Assistant were not met. VC's Annual FTES goal was met, i.e., FTES exceeded the minimum number required for maintaining a medium-size college designation.

C. Overall Evaluation of Institutional Effectiveness

The goals associated with Faculty Productivity and the 75/25 Ratio were not met. As was the trend statewide, the college experienced enrollment challenges. Additionally, mitigating factors at the state level, such as changes in repeatability and academic progress, further affected enrollment negatively. At the college level, we moved away from offering extra-large classes, opting instead to offer additional sections (for which we hired more part-time faculty), which was another factor that contributed to the decrease in Faculty Productivity and the 75/25 Ratio. In order to improve our performance in this area and to help us work more effectively when changes are made at the state level, the college is actively examining different data tools to improve scheduling practices. Further, the college is planning to hire a significant number of full-time faculty for the 2016-2017 academic year, which will improve the 75/25 ratio.

Beginning in 2016, the Core Indicators of Effectiveness will be assessed to determine if the number of metrics needs to be reduced or modified. Both the State Chancellor's Office and the ACCJC have recently developed metrics that the College is required to report on annually. These metrics focus largely on student completion and achievement, and include a large degree of overlap. By revising the Core Indicators to focus on these metrics, it will better align the college's priorities with those of the State of California, and the ACCJC. Further, time and effort related to reporting requirements would be reduced.

Work is being done campus-wide to improve these metrics. The USDE Title V-HSI Co-operative grant (2010-2015) has a large professional development component and continues to offer the Summer Institute for Teaching Excellence (SITE) each year. The grant also has a Distance Education focus, and increased faculty training has helped to raise our student success numbers in distance education classes. The Title V-HSI grant (2012-2017) focuses on increasing student transfer. Also, under this grant, the college was able to hire its first qualitative research analyst. Since then, the college has conducted focus groups and other qualitative studies to gather additional important data about our students. The college's Student Equity Plan focuses directly on improving outcomes for underrepresented groups. Through this plan, and the Achieving the Dream initiative, it is our intention that faculty, staff, and administrators better understand the importance of equity, of creating a welcoming environment for all students, and of being "change agents," regardless of the discipline or service area in which they work. Finally, the college's SSSP plan will ensure that incoming students receive the early services that have been shown by multiple studies to improve their outcomes at the college.

1. Course Completion Rate

The Course Completion Rate is the <u>percentage</u> of students who do <u>not</u> withdraw (receive W's) from class and who receive a grade notation of A, B, C, P, D, F, NP, RD, or I*.

The baseline course completion rate (2008–2009) is **83.4%**. Over the last five years, completion rates have consistently exceeded the baseline. In 2013–2014 (the most current year), the completion rate was **84.6%**, which **exceeded** the baseline by **1.2** percentage points.

The table below provides course completion rates and the data that were used to compute the rates.

2. Course Success Rate

Using VC's **2008–2009** course success rate as a **baseline**, **maintain or increase** the fall/spring annual course success rate in future years.

The Course Success Rate is the <u>percentage</u> of students who receive a passing/satisfactory grade notation of A, B, IB, C, IC, or P.

The baseline course success rate (2008–2009) is **66.7%**. Over the last five years, success rates have consistently exceeded the baseline. In 2013–2014 (the most current year), the success rate was **71.2%**, which **exceeded** the baseline by **4.5** percentage points.

b. Transfer Velocity:

With **2005-2006** as the **baseline** year, **maintain or increase** the percentage of VC students who transfer **within four years** to a public or independent four-year institution within the US.

The CCC Chancellor's Office – Transfer Velocity Project tracks cohorts of first-time college students for six years to determine if they show "behavioral intent to transfer" (i.e., they accumulated a minimum of 12 earned units and they attempted a transfer-level Math or English course).

The <u>four-year</u> transfer rate for the **2005-2006** cohort (the baseline rate) is **29**%; the transfer rate for the most recent cohort (**2008-2009**) is **22**%. The transfer velocity rate has **decreased** by **7** points.

c. Transfer Certified:

Using **2009-2010** as the **baseline** year, **maintain or increase** the number of students who are CSU-GE or IGETC certified.

In 2009–2010, the baseline year, VC awarded **154** "transfer certificates." In each of the succeeding years, the number of "transfer certificates" has **exceeded** the baseline rate. In 2013–2014, the college awarded **462** "transfer certificates."

F. District Institutional Effectiveness Report

Background

In early spring 2012, the District Committee for Accreditation and Planning (DCAP) began developing a common set of measurements to assess the institutional effectiveness of the three district colleges. After reviewing the effectiveness measures used at each college, DCAP established ten overall district-wide metrics. These standards relate to student achievement and goal attainment, as well as productivity rates and Student Learning Outcomes/Service Unit Outcomes.

A subcommittee of the district Institutional Research Advisory Committee (IRAC) was charged with collecting and analyzing the data and then preparing a written report for DCAP's review. The subcommittee, which included the college researchers, completed the final version of the report in June 2012. The report is entitled "Institutional Effectiveness – Moorpark, Oxnard and Ventura Colleges."


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A. FTES Enrollments



B-1. Overall Headcount

Between 2005 and 2009, headcount enrollments grew progressively from 19,231 to 23,060. Since 2009, enrollments have steadily declined to **18,109** in **2014**. In future years, the college expects headcounts to show moderate gains through increased course offerings made possible by improved state funding.



B-2. Gender

B-3. Race/Ethnicity - Data Tables

In 2009, the number of Hispanic/Latino students at Ventura College surpassed the number of White students, resulting in Hispanics becoming the largest racial/ethnic group at the college. In **2014**, the proportion of Hispanic students at VC was **54%** compared to **33%** for White students. As of the 2010 U.S. Census, the percentage of Hispanics residing in the college's **service area** was **43%**, which is **11** percentage points *lower* than Hispanic student enrollment at Ventura College in 2014.







B-6. Hispanic Students by Gender

Over the last decade, the percentage distribution of Hispanic students by gender has been similar to the percentage gender distribution for all students at Ventura College. Generally, the percentage of Hispanic students who were female was **one** percentage point *higher* than it was for the percentage of the entire student body that was female. The percentage of Hispanic students who were male was **one** percentage point *lower* than it was for the percentage of the entire student body that was male.

In **2014**, **55.7%** of Hispanic students were females compared to **54.5%** for the entire student body; the percentage of Hispanic students that were males was **43.7%** versus **44.8%** for all students.

Over the past decade at VC, the percentage distribution of students by Age Group has shown an increase in the younger student groups and a decrease in older student groups (see the data table on the bottom of this page and the chart on next the page). In the "20 to 24" group, there is a 9 percentage point increase from 2005 to 2014.

In **2014**, the percentage of Hispanics students at VC in the "19 or younger" age group was 35% compared to 28% for All Other Students (see the table below). Over **74%** of **Hispanic** students in **2014** were **less than 25** years of age versus **61%** for All Other students.







C-2. Distance Education Enrollments

During the decade, enrollments in distance education (D/E) classes at VC grew from 2,429 in 2005 to 11,568 in 2010. After 2010, D/E enrollments declined, as did total college enrollments. In **2014**, total college enrollments were **77,824**, of which **9,032** (**11.6%**) were in distance education classes.



C-3. Distance Education Outcomes

Success rates in D/E courses at VC average about **10** percentage points *lower* than in **all** non-D/E courses. Through a new (2010) Title V Cooperative Grant, Ventura College is creating initiatives to address the lower success rates in D/E courses. Summer Institutes (as part of the grant's Professional Development component) have been conducted to provide instructors with the latest strategies and pedagogies for increasing success rates in both D/E and non-D/E classes. Additionally, a distance education orientation has been created to assist new D/E students familiarize themselves with the computer technology, software, and procedures associated with classes offered via a distance education modality.

Each semester, the Office of Research and Evaluation prepares a detailed report on student outcomes in all D/E classes. These reports are available on the Institutional Research webpage.


IV. FALL TERM ENROLLMENT TRENDS

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B-1. Gender

Over the past decade, the proportion of **female** students at Ventura College has been about **56%**, with **males** accounting for about **43%** of all students (the remaining 1% was composed students who did not report their gender). In **fall 2014**, the **statewide** gender proportions were 53% female, 46% male, and 1% unreported. The percentage of female students at **VC** in **fall 2014** was 55%, which is slightly **above** than the statewide average; the percentage of male students was 44%, about two percentage points **below** the statewide average.

B-2. Race/Ethnicity - Data Tables


In fall 2008, the number of Hispanic students at Ventura College surpassed the number of White students, resulting in Hispanics becoming the largest racial/ethnic group at the college. In **fall 2014**, the proportion of Hispanic students at VC was **57%** compared to **30%** for White students. As of the 2010 U.S. Census, the percentage of Hispanics residing in the college's **service area** was **43%**, which is **12** percentage points *lower* than Hispanic student enrollment at Ventura College in fall 2014.





B-4. Enrollment Status


The percentage distributions of Ventura College students by enrollment status have remained relatively stable over the last five years. The exception is first-time students, whose relative percentage has dropped from 23% (3,002 students) in fall 2013 to 18% (2,328 students) in fall 2014. That is a *decrease* of 674 students or 22%.




B-6. Educational Goal – Chart









C-1. Course Enrollments – By Credit Status





V. STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

A-1. Student Success Scorecard – Overview and VC Outcomes

The Accountability Reporting for the Community Colleges (ARCC) Report was created in response to California Assembly Bill 1417 (2004), which required the establishment of a performance measurement system for the California Community Colleges (CCC). As a result of that legislation, the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office developed the ARCC, a report which contained performance indicators for both the community college system (as an entity) and the individual colleges. The first ARCC report was completed in 2007 and the last report was published in 2012.

In fall 2012, the Seymour-Campbell **Student Success Act of 2012** (**SB1456**) was signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown. **SB1456** resulted from the findings of the Student Success Task Force (SSTF), a work group established by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors. One of the twenty-two recommendations set forth by the SSTF was for the California Community Colleges to develop a new accountability reporting system that would define key student success metrics and present them in a clear and concise manner. In spring 2013, the CCC Chancellor's Office introduced the statewide and college-level **Student Success Scorecard**, which was built on and superseded the **ARCC**.

The **Student Success Scorecard** consists of **six** metrics, of which the following **four** were carried over from the ARCC: Student Progress & Achievement or Completion, Persistence, At Least 30 Units, and Career Development and College Preparation rates. **Two** new metrics were added to the Scorecard: Remedial Progress, and Career Technical Education rate.

The following table provides a summary of VC's performance on scorecard metrics, including Statewide rates for the 2015 Scorecard (2008-2009 cohort) and the difference between VC's 2015 rates and the Statewide 2015 rates. Positive differences (where the college's rate is higher than the Statewide rate) are highlighted in blue and negative differences are highlighted in pink.



B-1. Grades Distributions and Success / Retention Rates

Course success rates at Ventura College have been steadily *increasing* since the 16-year **low** of **65.8%** in fall 2007. In **fall 2014**, the course success rate was **72.3%** compared to the statewide rate of **69.1%**. VC's **fall 2014** retention rate of **85.7%** compares favorably to the statewide average of **86.0%**.














B-5. Success / Retention Rates by Age Group - Charts







B-9. Success / Retention Rates by Mode of Delivery

Over the last five fall terms, Success Rates in D/E courses at VC have been considerably *lower* than in all other courses. Through a Title V Cooperative Grant (2010 - 2015), Ventura College is creating initiatives to address the lower success rates in D/E courses. A Summer Institute (as part of the grant's Professional Development component) has been conducted each year to provide instructors with the latest strategies and pedagogies for increasing success rates in D/E classes. Additionally, a distance education orientation has been created to assist new D/E students familiarize themselves with the computer technology, software, and procedures associated with D/E classes.

Each semester, the Office of Research and Evaluation prepares a detailed report on student outcomes in all D/E classes. The reports present success and retention rates in each D/E section offered in the fall and spring terms. Success and retention rates in D/E courses are compared to the success and retention rates in the respective traditional courses. These reports are available on the Institutional Effectiveness webpage.





B-10. Success / Retention Rates at VC Santa Paula

For over 35 years, Ventura College has maintained a satellite campus in the City of Santa Paula to serve the post-secondary educational needs of residents of the Santa Clara River Valley (SCRV). The SCRV encompasses the cities of Fillmore and Santa Paula and includes the unincorporated area of Piru. As of 2010, the population in the Santa Paula and Fillmore CCDs (census county divisions) is 51,548.

For many years the college's educational site at Santa Paula was known as the East Campus. In fall 2011, the site was renamed **Ventura College – Santa Paula**. In the table below, enrollment numbers for **VC Santa Paula** also include enrollments for courses that were offered at Santa Paula High School and at Fillmore High School. In **fall 2014**, Success Rates for courses at **VC Santa Paula** were 3.7 percentage points *lower* than courses offered at the **VC Main Campus** (and other off-campus sites).


D-1. 1st-Time Students – Gender

Over the past decade, the proportion of **female** students attending Ventura College has been about **55%** compared to **45%** for **males**.

For **first-time** students, however, the percentages of females and males have been within **two** to **three** percentage points of each other. In the table below, the campus-wide percentages of females and males in **fall 2014** are compared to the percentages of females and males who were <u>first-time</u> students in fall 2014. In the general student population, the percentage of **females** is **10** percentage points **higher** than for males (54.7% females versus 44.2% males); however, among **first-time** students, the percentage of **males** is **2.6** percentage points **higher** than for females (50.2% males; 47.6% females).





D-4. 1st-Time Students - Economic Status

In this analysis, students receiving a Board of Governors Waiver (BOGW) are considered to be "economically disadvantaged." At Ventura College, the percentage of **first-time** students receiving BOG Waivers has been steadily increasing over the last five fall terms. Most likely, the main factor contributing to this increase in the percentage of students receiving BOG Waivers is the Ventura College Promise

The Ventura College Promise is a program sponsored by the Ventura College Foundation that is designed:


To remove the economic barriers to education for graduating Ventura County high school seniors

To improve the college-going rate in Ventura County

To enhance the quality of the workforce in Ventura County

The "Promise" is that all Ventura County high school graduates will have their enrollment fees covered during their **first year** of attendance at Ventura College. This same promise is extended to students who have successfully completed their GED requirements or who have completed the coursework for high school, but have not yet passed their exit exam. Expenses covered by the Ventura College Promise include the per-unit cost of classes, the Student Rep fee, the Health fee, and the Student Center fee.


To qualify for the Ventura College Promise, Ventura County high school graduates must complete the FAFSA and the BOG Fee Waiver Application. Students who meet the BOGW criteria have their unit enrollment costs waived and the Ventura College Promise only pays the remaining student-related fees.






Over the past five fall terms, percentage enrollments by course credit status have remained relatively stable for first-time students. From fall 2010 to fall 2014, percentage enrollments in Transfer-Level courses has declined slightly (-1.8 percentage points) while percentage enrollments in Degree Applicable courses has increased by a minimal amount (+0.3 percentage point). Percentage enrollments in Basic Skills have increased from 7.1% (fall 2010) to 8.6% (fall 2014).



V. STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

E-1. Overall Persistence Rates of First-Time Students – Data Table

Over the past five fall terms, **Persistence Rates** of **first-time** students at Ventura College have remained fairly consistent. For the **fall 2013** cohort, the fall-to-spring rate was 80% and the fall-to-fall rate was 64%. Students were considered to have persisted if their subsequent-term enrollments were in any of the three VCCCD colleges (Moorpark, Oxnard, or Ventura).

Persistence rates for the fall 2010 cohort were computed for **ten** semesters, from fall 2010 to spring 2015. By spring 2015, 19% of the students in the fall 2010 cohort were still enrolled in one/more courses. Three of the cohorts (fall 2010, 2011, and 2012) were tracked for at least three years (six semesters, including the initial fall term). Persistence to the sixth term was 43% (fall 2010), 41% (fall 2011), and 42% (fall 2012). The chart on the following page graphically depicts the six-term persistence rates for these three cohorts.

Definitions and Description

Initial-Term Enrollment

The **Initial Term** cohort consists of **first-time** students in **that fall term** who received **at least one** grade notation of A, B, IB, C, IC, P, D, ID, F, IF, NP, INP, or W.

Subsequent-Term Enrollment

A **Subsequent Term** enrollment means that a student in an Initial Term cohort enrolled in a subsequent term and received **at least one** grade notation of A, B, IB, C, IC, P, D, ID, F, IF, NP, INP, or W. The subsequent-term enrollment could be in any VCCCD college (Moorpark, Oxnard, or Ventura).

Persistence

Persistence is enrollment in a Subsequent Term. Students who skip terms (i.e., don't maintain continuous enrollment) are **counted** in the term/s in which they were enrolled.



E-1. Overall Persistence Rates of First-Time Students - Chart


Persistence rates of first-time students who began at Ventura College in fall 2010, fall 2011, or fall 2012 are depicted (in the graph below) over a six semester period. The 1st Term is the initial fall semester for each cohort; the 2nd Term is the subsequent spring semester; the 3rd Term is the following fall term; etc.

Persistence rates for the three cohorts are nearly equivalent. The largest variation in rates occurred in the fourth term: the fall 2010 cohort is 61%, the fall 2011 cohort is 59%, and the fall 2012 cohort is 57%.



E-2. Persistence Rates of First-Time Students: By Gender

Fall-to-spring **persistence rates** for **female** students average about **four** percentage points higher than the rates for **males**. The fall-to-fall persistence rates for **females** exceed **male** rates by about **five** points.

E-3. Persistence Rates of First-Time Students: By Race/Ethnicity – Data Table

Persistence Rates of **first-time** students at Ventura College vary considerably among Racial/Ethnic groups. Asian students have the highest fall-to-spring and fall-to-fall persistence rates. In **fall 2013**, Hispanic student persistence rates were 82% (fall to spring) and 66% (fall to fall), higher than those of White students.

Fall-to-spring and fall-to-fall persistence rates for Black students are generally lower than for Hispanic or White students. The fall-to-fall persistence for Black students ranged from a high of 62% to a low of 43%. Because the number of first-time Black students each fall term are relatively low, their persistence rates have a greater tendency to fluctuate than the persistence rates of Hispanic or White students.


Persistence rates of Native American students and Pacific Island students also have an inherent tendency to fluctuate because of the very low enrollments of students in these racial/ethnic groups. For example, the enrollments of first-time Pacific Islanders were 13 (fall 2010), 14 (fall 2011), 2 (fall 2012), and 5 (fall 2009). The fall-to-spring persistence rates of these students were 62%, 86%, 100%, and 40%, respectively.

E-4. Persistence Rates of First-Time Students: By Age Group – Data Table

Persistence Rates of **first-time** students vary significantly among **Age Groups**. First-time students in the "19 / younger" age group have fall-to-spring and fall-to-fall persistence rates that are close to 50% higher than the persistence rates of the next highest age group. The fall-to-spring persistence rates for students in the "19 / younger" age group range from 85% to 87%. Fall-to-fall persistence rates for the "19 / younger" students have increased from 70% (fall 2010 cohort) to 74% (fall 2014 cohort).

The age group with the lowest persistence rates is the "50 or older" category. It is not surprising that this age group has the lowest persistence rates since these students were probably not seeking a certificate, degree, or transfer. They were most likely taking a course/s for pleasure or to gain specific knowledge in a certain subject area.





C-1. Summary of Transfers by Educational System or Institutional Category

Over the past 10 years, Ventura College transferred its greatest number of students (1,153) in 2007-2008. In 2008-2009, transfers declined to 946; in 2013-2014, transfers have risen to 1,050. It should be noted that declines in transfers occurred across the California Community College System in 2008-2009 and 2009-2010.

Transfers to In-State Private and Out-of-State institutions accounted for a significant portion of total VC transfers over the last four years. In **2013-2014**, **30%** of VC transfers went to ISPs and OOS institutions.

C-2. Transfers to Campuses of the University of California

Ventura College transfers to the UC System reached its peak in 2004–2005 at **169** students. The least amount of transfers (during the last 10 years) occurred in 2008–2009, when VC transferred **103** students. Currently (**2013–2014**), the number of VC transfers to UC schools is **120**.

In the table below, the numbers and percentages of VC students transferring to UC campuses in **2009–2010** are compared to those in **2013–2014**. UCSB remains the UC campus with the most VC transfers; however, as a proportion of all VC transfers to the UC System, UCSB's percentage has <u>decreased</u> from 48% in 2009–2010 to 33% in 2013-2014.

CSU Performance Measures

Through its Division of Analytic Studies, the California State University (CSU) System regularly provides information on the performance of CCC students who have transferred to CSU campuses. The metrics, which pertain to academic **preparation** and **performance** of CCC transfers, are reported separately for **each** college and in aggregate for **all** CC colleges. In the table below, the academic preparation and CSU performance of VC transfers are compared to transfers from all CC colleges. The table is divided into the following four sections.

Average Transfer GPA

CSU refers to this metric as the One-Year Continuation Rate – It is the percentage of transfer students enrolling at CSU campuses in a given fall term who re-enroll (i.e., continue) at the same CSU campus in the subsequent fall term

Average CSU GPA

Average CSU GPA of transfer students who persisted from one fall tem to the next fall term

Performance of Ventura College Transfers

Average Transfer GPA: VC's transfer GPAs have <u>always</u> been *higher* than the All CCC's GPAs CSU Persistence Rate: VC's persistence rate is <u>usually</u> slightly *lower* than the All CCC's rate Average CSU GPA: VC's CSU GPAs are usually *lower* than the All CCC's GPAs

Chart A. CSU Persistence Rates of CCC Transfers





Chart B. CSU GPA's of CCC Transfers



C-5. Transfers to CSU Channel Islands – Bachelor Degrees by Ethnicity

Data in the following tables were extracted from the April 2011, **CSU-CI Transfer-Student Success Report**. The report was provided to VC's Executive Vice President by the Provost's Office at CSU Channel Islands. In the context of the CSU-CI report, a transfer student is **successful** if he/she receives a baccalaureate degree from CSU-CI. The report is limited to transfer students from VCCCD colleges.

In **Tables A** and **B**, data in the **Trn** columns indicate the numbers of **transfer** students, while data in the **D** columns show the numbers of students that received BA/B **degree** from CSU-CI. For example, in Table A, in the Fall 2005 Cohort, 40 Hispanic students transferred (**Trn**) to CSU-CI of which 29 received a BA/BS degree (**D**), which is a success rate of 73% [$(29 \div 40) \times 100$]. **Note:** In Table A, overall success rates decline from fall 2005 to fall 2009 because the more recent transfers have had *less* time to obtain a BA/BS degree.

Chart A. Transfers to CSU-CI by VCCCD College - Total of Fall Terms: 2005 through 2009





Chart B. Ventura College Transfers to CSU-CI by Ethnicity – Total of Fall Terms: 2005 through 2009



C-6. Transfer Velocity Cohort Report (CCCC Chancellor's Office)

Introduction

The **Transfer Velocity Project** tracks cohorts of first-time college students for six years to determine if they show "behavioral intent to transfer" (i.e., they accumulated a minimum of 12 earned units and they attempted a transfer-level Math or English course). Students who show "behavioral intent to transfer" are formed into **Transfer Cohorts**. Although Transfer Cohorts are not <u>finalized</u> until <u>six years</u> (6) after initial enrollment, once a cohort has been established, the cohort's transfer rates can be retroactively calculated for years three (3), four (4) and five (5). Actual transfers to public or private four-year institutions within the United States are determined by matching student data to one of the following databases: National Student Clearinghouse (NSC), University of California (UC) or California State University (CSU). The **Transfer Rate** is computed by dividing the number of students with enrollments at a four-year institution by the total size of the Transfer Cohort.

Ventura College Transfer Rates Compared to Statewide Averages

In the table below, Transfer Rates for the **2008-2009** VC cohort are compared to the statewide averages. After **three years** and **six years** (conventional milestones for assessing community college transfer rates):

Three Years: Ventura College and Statewide Transfer Rates are *equivalent* at **12%** each.

Six Years: Ventura College Transfer Rate is higher than the Statewide Rate: 39% versus 38%.

Ventura College: Transfer Rates by Race/Ethnicity

Of the **1,501** students in the 2008–2009 cohort, **43%** (**647** students) are Hispanic and **40%** (**595**) are White. After **three years**, the overall VC Transfer Rate is **12%**; for Hispanics it is **8%**, for Whites it is **13%**. At **six years** out, the overall Transfer Rate is **39%**; the Hispanic rate is **32%** compared to **41%** for Whites.



A. Staffing by Employee Category

Since fall 2008, the total number of Ventura College employees has fallen from 732 to 608 (fall 2014); a loss of 124 individuals, or 17% of the college workforce. Fall 2013 was the term with the lowest employment level.

Of the four employee groups identified below, only Full-Time Faculty experienced a growth in ranks: from 136 in fall 2008 to 141 in fall 2014. During that period, Classified Staff <u>decreased</u> by **30%**, Part-Time Faculty were reduced by **17%**, and the number of Managers and Supervisors went from 29 to 23, a reduction of **21%**.

E-1. General Fund Expenditures by Category

Over the past **ten** years, total **Unrestricted General Fund Expenditures** (**GFE**) for VC has ranged from a low of **\$32,963,811** (2004-2005) to a high of **\$42,371,838** (2010-2011), a difference of **\$9,408,027** or **28%**. For 2013-2014, total GFE was **\$41,140,738**, which is **\$1,23,100** (**3%**) below the high in 2010-2011. Salaries and Benefits account for the largest percentage of general fund expenditures, exceeding **96%** of total GFE in 2013-2014. Faculty salaries constitute the single largest expenditure at roughly **50%** per year. Cost per FTES was at its highest in 2013-2014 (**\$4,251**).



This chart depicts the relationships between **Total GFE** (in thousands), **Total FTES**, and **Cost per FTES**. Total FTES (plotted on the right-hand scale) reached a high of **11,141** in 2008-2009.



E-3. Expenditure Categories as a Percentage of Total Expenses

The only expense category that has consistently risen over the last ten years – in both dollar amount and percentage* – is **employee benefits**. In **2004-2005**, the cost for employee benefits was **\$5,970,637**, which accounted for **18**% of total GFE. By **2013-2014**, the cost for employee benefits had risen to **\$11,560,544**, or **28**% of total GFE.

Over the past decade, employee benefits have grown by **\$5,589,907**, or **94%**. In contrast, expenditures for faculty salaries have only increased by **10%** (\$1,905,444) over the same period.

Direct Expenditures have fluctuated between **10%** and **4%** of total GFE. In 2013-2014, the percentage of direct expenditures (**3.8%**) was the lowest in the past decade.

E-4. Chart of Salaries and Benefits as a Percentage of Total Expenses

Salaries and Employee Benefits are the largest portion of total GFE. The top line in the chart below represents **total** salaries and employee benefits for each of the previous ten AYs. The major component of Salaries and Employee Benefits is **faculty salaries**, which are depicted on the second line from the top. Faculty salaries have hovered around **50%** of total GFE, except in 2004-2005 when they were 56% of GFE.

Employee Benefits, represented by the **red** line in the chart, have continuously risen over the last decade from **18%** to **28%** (except for a 0.5 point drop from 2006-2007 to 2007-2008).
