1. ADA Compliance

- a. Lack of visual/audio aid
 - Conversing textbooks
 - Documents not readable by software
 - No screen readers in offices
 - Tutoring for math (hard to translate)
 - Maps for blind students (GPS-could be student project)
 - Letting students go to classrooms before term starts to see where their class will be (for visually impaired but also others
- b. Faculty knowledge/compliance (Law)
 - What is the law? Allowing aide in class, testing
 - What students need
 - Attitude of faculty
 - Identifying themselves/being anonymous
 - Testing so may miss lecture/different exam if taking it at EAC/feel being punished
 - Harder tests given if taken at EAC because they have more time
