4. Complete a minimum of 60 degree-applicable units.

This major prepares students for transferring to International Studies programs at four-year colleges and universities. Since a great portion of hi-tech, pharmaceutical and other U.S. products is exported, a double major with one in Global Studies substantially increases employment opportunities. For those students not choosing to major in International Studies, this program offers a strong foundation in basic global knowledge which today is a prerequisite for conducting business in most successful enterprises, and helps those students prepare for related occupational and vocational opportunities which are rapidly growing in this area.

## Submission of non-transfer courses for CCC-only Descriptors:

C-ID recently announced the availability of descriptors intended for use within the California community colleges, geared towards career technical education (CTE) courses - these descriptors are denoted with the suffix "X". As you know, courses submitted to C-ID are validated against courses in the ASSIST database. This same validation will take place with regard to non-transferable courses submitted to C-ID. While a majority of the courses housed on ASSIST are transferable, ASSIST is committed to supporting the work of C-ID which includes an understanding that community colleges will need to add non-transferable courses to ASSIST in order to facilitate C-ID submissions for descriptors intended for use only within the California community college system. This C-ID/ASSIST partnership further supports the transition of the C-ID course submission process to the ASSIST Next Generation system in 2017.

Non-transferable courses which need to be added to ASSIST outside of a normal curriculum update cycle should be submitted via the ASSIST Curriculum Additions and Changes form (http://www.assist.org/utilities/correction.do). Please note that C-ID receives ASSIST course data twice a month, on the $5^{\text {th }}$ and $20^{\text {th }}$.
