RN's may specialize by providing preventative and acute care in all health care settings to various segments of the population including newborns (neonatology), children and adolescents (pediatrics), adults and elderly (gerontology or geriatrics). RN's also may provide basic health care to patients outside of health care settings in such venues including correctional facilities, schools, summer camps, and the military. Some RN's travel around the United States and abroad providing care to patients in area with shortages of medical professionals.

- Some RNs choose to become advanced practice nurses, who often are considered primary health care practitioners and work independently or in collaboration with physicians.
