 The College has an intentional and thoughtful planning process that is collaborative and includes all campus constituent groups. The College has made a commitment to engaging in the institutional strategic planning process, taking the time to plan and not rushing through the preparation of its plan. The following plans have been completed: Education Master Plan, Strategic Implementation Plan, Technology Master Plan, Equity Plan, and Guided Pathways Scale of Adoption Plan. The Equity Plan is being revised because the campus felt it was a rushed process and did not permit adequate development. The campus desires to develop a comprehensive master plan that integrates key components of each plan. 	 Currently, the College has an interim Facilities Master Plan and has begun the process to identify a firm to review submitted bids. The campus is interested in the following supports to ensure a successful process: Identify consulting services to develop a Facilities Master Plan that is sustainable and aligns with capital resources available for major renovations and new buildings. Receive assistance on process to prioritize facilities needs. Develop a detailed rubric to screen, identify and select finalists to present their proposals. Develop a strategy to ensure campus participation that includes a communication plan that involves campus forums, meeting schedules
 There have been significant efforts to institutionalize the implementation of AB705. The College has been implementing the practices and principles in English since 2017, prior to the passage of AB705. Successes to date: The data indicates significant increases in student completion in English Composition. The implementation of Math began in Fall 2019. The data analysis for Math is in its early stages and indicates positive outcomes. The campus has prepared a detailed document titled, "Teaming Up for Student Success: Implementing AB705." 	 and internal and external communiques. Developing a new comprehensive Facilities Master Plan to incorporate the components of previous plans with others, including Education Master Plan, Strategic Implementation Plan, Technology Master Plan, Equity Plan, and Guided Pathways Scale of Adoption Plan.	 Using the Educational Master Plan (EMP) as a starting point: Develop specific priorities for planning based on the College's equity focus, technology needs, and Guided Pathways priorities. The College's mission and the specific values it places on students and success should be used as the heart of prioritizing and should drive the development of priorities for facilities improvement and technology planning. Identify where the College's equity goals, technology goals, and Guided Pathways goals should be added to the Interim Facilities Master Plan (FMP); develop and add language that explicitly addresses these goals. Ensure that a clear understanding of the priorities of the College exists before seeking future bids for facilities work. Identify available funds, and funding opportunities, for facilities improvement and for technology needs. Align and prioritize facility improvement needs, technology needs, and equity/student success goals with available funds for facilities improvement. 	 1,2 The current Facilities Master Plan lacks an explicit connection to the Equity Plan and Guided Pathways scale of Adoption Assessment.
